An X-ray of the situation in Mexico leading into 2030





Each year, 1.19 million people lose their lives to **traffic injuries.** To combat this, the United Nations has declared a second Decade of Action for Road Safety 2021-2030, with the goal of at least halving the number of fatalities and serious injuries by 2030.

Mexico

is the country with the ninth highest number of fatalities at the global level and the second highest in Latin America.







This means that we are moving away from the goals set for 2030.

Evolution and Goals of the Decade of Action 2021-2030

The goal for 2022 was estimated at 12,074 deaths but 15,674 were reported, which is 30% more than expected.

If this trend continues, in 2030 there may be 25,434 people who lose their lives in this way (279% more).






Serious injuries

The goal in 2022 was estimated at 24,975, but 42,736 were reported, which means 71% more serious injuries than expected.
